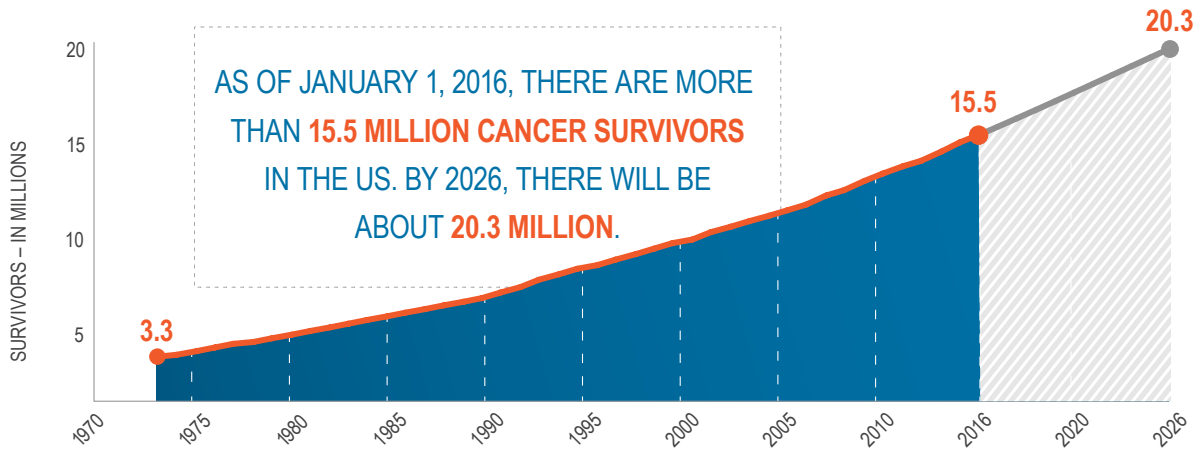


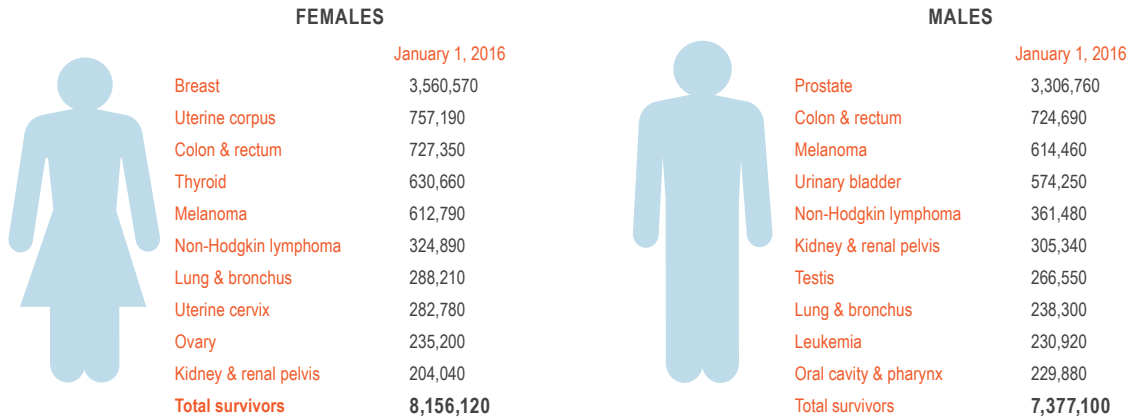
The number of cancer survivors in the United States is increasing, and is expected to grow to about 20.3 million by 2026 according to *Cancer Treatment & Survivorship Facts & Figures 2016-2017*. As this population continues to increase, it will be more important than ever to address this group's unique needs.



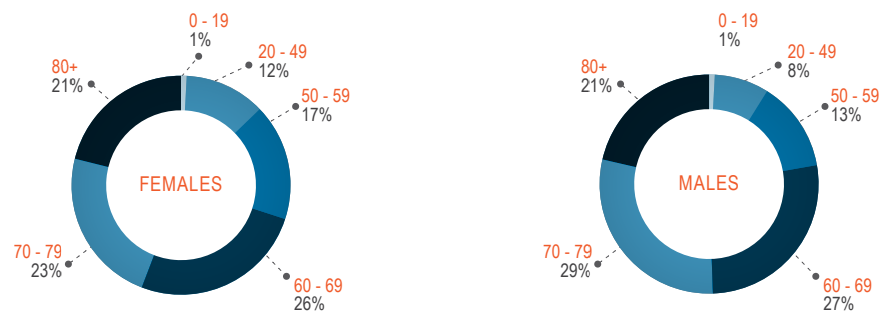

SURVIVORS BY SEX AND CANCER SITE

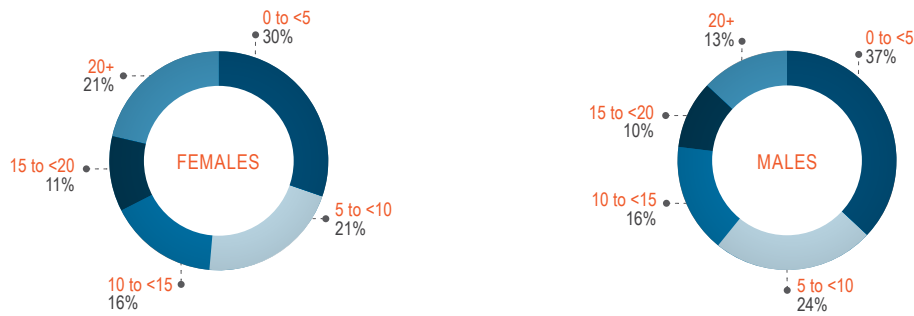


SURVIVORS BY AGE AT PREVALENCE*

SURVIVORS BY YEARS SINCE DIAGNOSIS



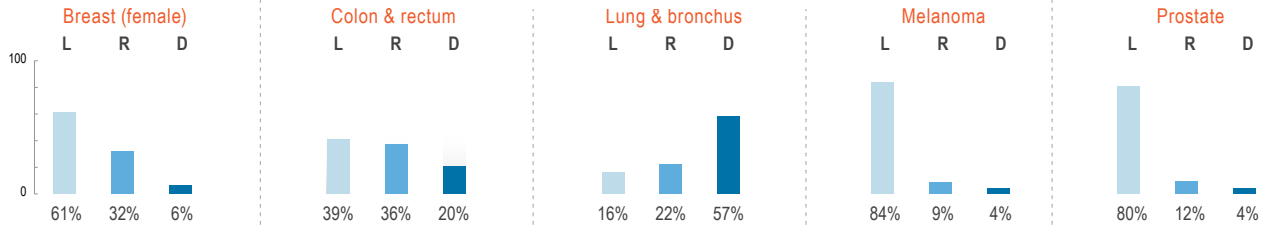
STAGE AT DIAGNOSIS AND SURVIVAL

(2005 - 2011)

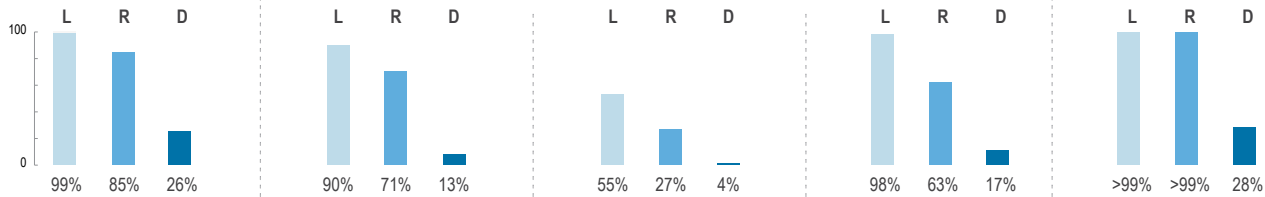
The earlier a diagnosis, the better the chances of survival

- **Localized (L)**
Confined to the organ of origin
- **Regional (R)**
Spread to nearby tissues or lymph nodes
- **Distant (D)**
Spread to other parts of the body

FACTORS THAT INFLUENCE CANCER SURVIVAL



EARLY DETECTION

Screening allows doctors to find some cancers earlier, when they are easier to treat. In some cases, screening can prevent cancer altogether.



IMPROVED TREATMENTS

More effective treatment options and improved clinical follow-up after treatment help people with cancer live longer.
